#### 1. Call to Order and Opening Remarks by the Chair

Mayor White called the meeting to order at 10 a.m. He recognized the CAPCOG Veterans. Mr. Miller introduced Shaun Seale, his new executive assistant.

#### 3. Consider Approving Minutes for the September 11, 2024, Meeting

Mayor White asked the board to consider the September 11, 2024, minutes. Mr. Baker made a motion to approve. Council Member Weiss seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

# 4. Consider Adopting the 2024 CAPCOG Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and Stakeholder Preparedness Plan (SPR)

#### Martin Ritchey, Director of Homeland Security

Mr. Ritchey presented the summary of the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and the 2024 CAPCOG Stakeholder Preparedness (SRP).

Commissioner Dockery made a motion to adopt the 2024 CAPCOG THIRA and SPR. Mayor Hughson seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

# 5. Consider Adopting the 2025 Homeland Security Strategic Plan Implementation Plan (HSSP-IP) Martin Ritchey, Director of Homeland Security

Mr. Ritchey presented the 2025 CAPCOG Homeland Security Strategic Plan Implementation Plan (HSSP-IP). Mr. Ritchey stated the changes in personnel and noted the updates to training and exercise objectives. He noted, stakeholders received 5,000 contact hours of homeland security training and there were no charges for any of the training. The process of selecting training and drafting the plan included

stakeholders from around the region. The stakeholders included cities, counties, hospitals, and emergency services group personnel.

Mayor Hughson made a motion to approve. Commissioner Dockery approved. The motion passed unanimously.

# 6. Consider Adopting the 2025 Homeland Security Grant Program Process Guidance Martin Ritchey, Director of Homeland Security

Mr. Ritchey presented the 2025 Homeland Security Grant Program Process Guidance for consideration. He mentioned there was a reduction in grant funding each year. He said there is an 11 percent reduction across the board. The process guidance was reviewed and approved by the Homeland Security Task Force.

Mr. Baker made a motion to adopt the 2025 Homeland Security Grant Program Process Guidance. Mayor Hughson seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

# 7. Consider Approving CAPCOG's Criminal Justice Policy Statement, Priorities, Project Summary Sheets and Scoring Criteria for Plan Year 2026

#### **Charles Simon, Director of Regional Planning and Services**

Mr. Simon presented the CAPCOG's Criminal Justice Policy Statement, Priorities, Project Summary Sheets and Scoring Criteria for Plan Year 2026. He stated the board is required to adopt the policy annually, and CAPCOG is required to follow the policy how it's defined. Last year the policy was greatly overhauled. The documents have revised definitions, revised objective scoring, and removed the need for applicants to rank their application preference. Last year the CJAC members recommended the amount each applicant should be funded. This is also being requested this year. The process now defines a gap year as when a project is funded one year, does not get funding the next year, then comes back for funding the following year. He noted the process would not count the gap year against the project.

There are plans to incorporate an online form use by March 2025. This will allow for immediate feedback to the applicant. An explanation of the 10 points being available to move to the project presentation from the completing project summary sheet was provided. The Regional Planning and Services staff is not privy to this information, as the application is submitted directly to the Office of the Governor.

Mayor Weiss asked if we could make it a required document when the application is submitted. Ms. Trevino stated, that is a possibility. Commissioner Long suggested leaving the points at 10 points, instead of reducing it to 5 points. Judge Bray asked if the applicants receive reminder email or phone calls.

Mr. Simon suggested the possibility of holding the item over until the next meeting.

Mayor Hughson made a motion to approve the Criminal Justice Grant Scoring Policy, with a change of 10 points being awarded for applicants who submit a project summary at the same time as the application deadline, and 5 points being awarded if it is past the application deadline. Someone seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

# 8. Consider Approving Updated Resolution for Regional Law Enforcement Academy Training Grant Andrew Hoekzema, Deputy Executive Director

Mr. Hoekzema presented an updated resolution for the Regional Law Enforcement Academy Training Grant and explained the state was requiring a change of the Executive Director from Ms. Betty Voights to Mr. Chris Miller.

Commissioner Dockery made a motion to the resolution. Judge Haden seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

# 9. Consider Approving Proclamation Declaring November 2024 as National Caregivers Month Jennifer Scott, Director of Aging Services

Ms. Scott declared that November 2024 as National Caregivers Month. She explained the struggles caregivers are faced with, to the point of neglecting their own health.

Judge Haden made a motion to approve the proclamation. Ms. Bruno seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

## 10. Consider Accepting the Quarterly Investment Report Silvia Alvarado, Director of Finance

Ms. Alvarado explained the quarterly Investment Report.

Judge Oakley made a motion to accept the report. Mr. Baker seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

# 11. Consider Approving Resolution Forming a Building Committee Betty Voights, Senior Advisor

Ms. Voights explained the lease process, noting CAPCOG's lease expires in March 2027.

Mayor White noted, the only requirement is one of the members must be a vice chair. Mayor White asked if the vice chair must be from 2024 or 2025? Mr. Miller noted, Judge Cunningham meets those criteria. Mayor White said, we have three members, and we need five members. Are there any other suggestions?

Judge Bray made a motion for the committee to be formed with the following members: Commissioner Boles, Council Member Weiss, Judge Cunningham, Commissioner Dockery, and Mayor Hougen. The motion passed unanimously.

# 12. Consider Approving Appointments to Advisory Committees Chris Miller, Executive Director

Mr. Miller requested the approval of the appointments to the advisory committees.

Mayor White asked if there were any appointments to advisory committees. Mr. Miller stated, we have Mr. Jason Snowgrove with the Lee County EMC with the Homeland Security Taskforce. The motion passed unanimously.

#### 13. Staff Reports

#### **Chris Miller, Executive Director**

Mr. Miller informed the Board of a planned legislative breakfast at the beginning of the year, once legislative session starts. Concentration will be on the legislative members and their staff. No advocacy. Staff will be informing them about CAPCOG. The General Assembly is December 11, 2024. We will have a speaker from the Texas Water Development Board to talk about water issues impacting the region.

# 89th Legislative Session Objectives

These objectives generally support any effort to encourage state agencies and partners to collaborate with regional councils to improve the health, safety and welfare of regions and enhance their communities' capacity.

#### Community and Economic Development

- 1. Support efforts to establish rural economic development programs utilizing regional councils as entities eligible to apply for and administer funds.
- 2. Support efforts to establish broadband programs utilizing regional councils as entities eligible to plan, apply for and administer funds.

#### **Environmental Quality**

- 1. Support maintaining the full appropriation of tipping fees and other available funding resources to regional councils for local and regional waste reduction programs, as provided by statute.
- 2. Support efforts to utilize resources for regional programs related to tire clean-up and illegal dumping.
- 3. Support efforts to utilize regional councils for air quality-related planning and programs.
- 4. Support efforts to utilize regional councils for water-related planning and programs.

#### **Emergency Communication**

- 1. Support efforts to allow regional councils the flexibility to use appropriations to meet local and regional needs as determined by the regional council board of directors.
- 2. Support the full appropriation and disbursement of the total dedicated revenue generated under and in compliance with Chapter 771 of the Texas Health and Safety Code.
- 3. Support efforts to enhance appropriation levels and funding options to meet program needs authorized under Chapter 771 of the Texas Health and Safety Code.

#### Health and Human Services

- 1. Support the use of the State Planning Regions as designated by the Governor, pursuant to Chapter 391, Local Government Code, for more efficient regional decentralizations of public health and state health and human services programs.
- 2. Support legislation and appropriations to continue strengthening the Long-Term Care Ombudsman program through the 28 Area Agencies on Aging.
- 3. Support local and regional efforts to address unmet mental health needs.
- 4. Support legislation and appropriations to enhance Home Delivered Meals and other senior nutrition programs.

#### **Public Safety Committee**

- 1. Support efforts to enhance the recognition of the need for state funding investment and involvement in regional interoperability.
- 2. Support efforts by the state to regionalize disaster recovery support functions including but not limited to natural disasters & public health response and recovery.
- 3. Support efforts to create and provide a mechanism for funding cybersecurity training awareness and hardening for local governments through existing regional structures.
- 4. Support the establishment of a dedicated funding stream to support regional law enforcement academies and trainings and expanded funding for regional roles in criminal justice planning and supports.
- 5. Support adequate continued funding for the Office of the Governor, Public Safety Office, Criminal Justice Division through the full appropriation of Fund 421.

#### **Transportation**

- 1. Support the use of regional councils of governments to unify and coordinate urban and rural transportation planning.
- 2. Support state and federal initiatives to provide funding for regional councils of governments to actively provide transportation planning and coordination as Rural Transportation Planning Organizations (RTPOs).
- 3. Support the implementation of multi-modal transportation initiatives that result in increased transportation options for all Texans, all counties, and economic stimulus for the state.
- 4. Support the collaboration between Rural Transportation Planning Organizations (RTPOs), Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) and Regional Mobility Authorities (RMAs) to seek federal funding to address regional multi-modal transportation needs.
- 5. Support efforts to fund regional programs to provide rural transit to unserved and underserved counties.





#### 2024 NADO Advocacy Priorities

### **Economic and Community Development**

- Encourage and increase federal funding for regional community planning, which lays the groundwork for the success of subsequent federal investments and project implementation.
- Support the programs and initiatives of the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration (EDA), particularly those focused on planning, public works, and predevelopment.
- Reauthorize the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration. Pass
  the <u>Economic Development Reauthorization Act of 2024 (S. 3891)</u> in the Senate and
  pursue the passage of similar legislation in the House. Senate Bill 3891 is a bipartisan bill
  which, if passed, would modernize and update crucial elements of EDA's statute and its
  investments for the first time in 20 years.
- Provide increased EDA Partnership Planning Grant funding for EDA-designated Economic Development Districts in annual appropriations. In FY 2025, NADO requests that Congress provide at least \$90 million for EDA Partnership Planning.
- Encourage and increase federal investment in the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant program.
- Across the board, increase federal share and reduce local match percentages for federal programs designed to benefit rural and underserved communities.
- Encourage federal and state level partners to work closely with Regional Development Organizations to align sources of funding and improve project planning and implementation.
- Preserve and prioritize local decision-making in the implementation of federal programs and funding.
- Increase federal investments in Regional Commissions including the Appalachian Regional Commission, the Delta Regional Authority, the Denali Commission, the Northern Border Regional Commission, the Southeast Crescent Regional Commission, and the Southwest Border Regional Commission. In doing so, increase federal investments in the Local Development Districts that serve as the core frontline partners working collaboratively with Regional Commissions at the local level.

## **Rural Capacity Building**

- Encourage and increase federal investments in U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development programs.
- Reauthorize the Farm Bill in 2024. Within Farm Bill reauthorization, authorize funding for the Rural Partnership Program, which would direct federal funding toward operating expenses for rural organizations.

#### **Workforce Development**

- Encourage and increase federal investments in workforce development and training programs and Workforce Investment Boards.
- Invest in entrepreneurship and innovation initiatives designed to benefit underserved and rural communities.

## Transportation, Infrastructure, and Broadband

- Expand and enhance the role of Regional Transportation Planning Organizations (RTPOs) and Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs).
- Direct more targeted resources to smaller communities, including those below a 50,000-population threshold.
- Increase funding allocated to MPOs and RTPOs, including Metropolitan Planning (PL) funds, State Planning and Research (SPR) funds, and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds. Additionally, establish a minimum funding floor for all such organizations.
- Reduce and/or eliminate local match requirements for rural communities (under 50,000 population) and small MPOs (50,000 to 200,000 population), recognizing that these communities are typically resource-challenged. Reductions in local match are particularly needed within the 5311 Rural Transit Program; the Safe Streets for All Program; the Rural Surface Transportation Grant Program; and the State Planning and Research Program.

#### **Public Health**

- Support the national network of Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs).
- Provide support to help older adults and people with disabilities improve their health, well-being, independence, and dignity within their homes and communities.

## **Disaster Mitigation and Resiliency**

- Encourage and increase federal investments that help communities build stronger, more resilient economies that are more insulated from economic shocks.
- Work directly with Regional Development Organizations to improve the implementation of disaster preparedness and disaster recovery funding, and to help regions mitigate, and recover from, natural disasters and economic disruptions.
